Dear Paul:

As you know, I represent Mr. William David Lindholm. Mr. Lindholm furnished substantial assistance to the United States by testifying in the Trenkler case, and did so with no promises or assurances of any kind that he would receive any benefit from such cooperation. Indeed, he concedes that there was no agreement, explicit or implicit, between the Government and him which provided for any reward of any kind in return for his assistance in the prosecution and conviction of Trenkler.

There is no question that the Government is under no legal obligation whatsoever to take any action to assist Mr. Lindholm in obtaining a reduced sentence, or obtaining any other kind of benefit or reward.

Nevertheless, his assistance was extraordinary. It was forthright, honest and compelling, and of immense value in strengthening the prosecution against Mr. Trenkler.

While Mr. Lindholm provided this assistance to the United States without any expectation of benefit, I believe that it my duty, as his counsel, to secure whatever benefit I can for him. There may be no enforceable legal obligation on the part of the Government to assist Mr. Lindholm, but I believe that fairness requires that your office seriously consider filing a motion before Judge Woodlock recommending that Mr. Lindholm's sentence be reduced because of his substantial assistance. It is simply the right thing to do.

I also believe that such a motion should recommend a significant reduction in Mr. Lindholm's sentence, bearing in mind not only the quality and importance of his

assistance, but the fact that he has served the great majority of his sentence thus far in uncomfortable (often rather primitive) county jail facilities in order to be readily available to the Government prior to the Trenkler trial.

Mr. Lindholm was sentenced to serve 97 months, and has presently served approximately 31 months of that sentence. He is presently incarcerated at FPC Schuylkill, Minersville, Pennsylvania. He has been a model inmate.
